uring this walking tour, you will find botanical treasures gathered from near and far for your education, research and enjoyment. The COCC Arboretum includes a unique collection of flowering trees and shrubs as well as evergreen, coniferous trees native to the High Desert. Tree markers include information about the natural history of each species and tree identification techniques. Bring a friend and come often to enjoy the trees, exquisite mountain views, and native wildlife of the COCC Arboretum.

Due to the terrain of the campus, each walking tour has stairs and some elevation gain or loss. The Lower Campus tour provides a short and easy walk of about one mile. Allow approximately one hour of walking time for this section. The Upper Campus tour includes more elevation gain for a moderately difficult walk of about one mile. Allow about one and a half hours to complete this portion of the tour.


"A designated collection of trees and other woody plants that are made available for education, scientific research, ornamental and even artistic endeavors."

Why Use Scientific Names?

Common names of plants, which originate from cultural sources, can be confusing because there is often more than one common name for a plant and the same name can be used for two different species of plants. To prevent confusion, biologists have established standard rules for naming species using a binomial (two-name), Latin name. This prevents any overlap of names and allows for international usage and recognition.

Parking Information
