Why Collaborate

Benefits to Students

- Increases Engagement & Connection
 - With other students (2003, Tinto)
 - With faculty (2008, Kuh)
 - With content & learning (2003, Tinto)
- Develops Career Readiness Skills
 - Group work
 - Multi-disciplinary approaches to problem solving
 - Asked to consider multiple perspectives
- Identified as a High Impact Educational Practice
 - Association of American Colleges and Universities
 - Center for Community College Student Engagement



Benefits to Faculty

- Increases engagement& connection
 - With other faculty cross fertilization of ideas
 - Strengthens ties to college
- Opportunity to learn & improve practice
 - Try new ideas




Student Quote

Benefits to COCC

- 81% of students reported that their LC experience improved their interest in getting a degree
- 90% agreed that the skills they learned in their LC will help them be successful in future coursework
- 82% reported doing coursework with fellow LC students outside of class
- 99% agreed or strongly agreed that their LC teachers encouraged them to use campus resources (NOTE: support for learners was aspect of lowest engagement in 2011 CCSE survey results)
- 99% would encourage other students to take LC courses
